



Section 6: Measurement Tool and Timeline

In the Fall of 2019, Student Life updated outcomes to more accurately reflect desired areas of measurement for the department. After these changes the following data is examined annual at the conclusion of fall term:

- Students that are involved in a conduct violation will be able to explain how their actions affect their academic and personal success as measure by a survey immediately following their conduct hearing.
- Housing students will register by September 1 at a level equal to or greater than the comparator campus populations of non-housing students; to be measured by an internal Argos report during mid-fall quarter each year.
- Of students that work for the Broadside, 66% of students in editor positions and 80% of students in staff positions will successfully complete the term; success will be defined by passing the Journalism Lab course and being eligible for rehire. Data will be pulled by reviewing individual student records after grades post each quarter.

Section 7: Data

Based on our stated outcomes we began working to collect data that would allow us to determine the effectiveness of our actions and areas of needed improvement. Data results are below.

Outcome 1: As a result of an interim assignment undertaken on campus by the Conduct Administrator, data for this outcome was not collected – but will be collected in future years. A draft survey is complete and ready for use in AY 23-24.

Housing: Data regarding the registration dates of housing students compared to the general population is as follows:

- Fall 2021 general population (first-time, ages<=20, and Certificate/Degree Seeking)
 - 628 students
 - 433 (68.9%) had their first course added before 9/1/2021
- Fall 2021 Residents
 - 306 students
 - 252 (82.4%) had their first course added before 9/1/2021

The Broadside

Regarding the success rates of students in both editorial and staff positions at The Broadside we collected the following information regarding the Journalism Lab course:

- Fall – Editors passed at a rate of 100% (3 of 3) and Staff passed at a rate of 100% (2 of 2)
- Winter – Editors and Staff passed at a rate of 100% (7 of 7)
- Spring – Editors and Staff passed at a rate of 100% (8 of 8)
- Annual – Editors and Staff passed at a rate of 100%

“Success” was defined as passing the course and being eligible for rehire. All students in this period were eligible for rehire.

Section 8: Summary and Analysis

Conduct

Housing

The data regarding registration rates of housing students compared to the general population continues to be encouraging, with students living on campus registering at 13% higher rate than the comparative population not living on campus.

As with previous reports, the data would suggest that the intentional efforts on the part of housing staff to communicate the importance of registering for classes prior to living in Wickiup Hall are effectively working and students are responding. However, we can also see from this data that over 50 students were not registered by Sept. 1. This means that the housing team will continue to communicate the importance of registering early to all incoming students.

The Broadside

Based on the data that was collected from The Broadside, success rates in the course indicate that improvement was made over the previous reporting period. All Editors and Staff were successful in both passing the course and being eligible for rehire.

This success is especially encouraging as The Broadside had another Advisor turnover, with the new Advisor starting only a short period prior to Fall term, 2021. This speaks to the foundation that was created by the person previously in that role both in terms of systems and students that were recruited and trained as Staff that were then able to move into Editorial roles.

The Student Life Director and Broadside Advisor will continue to evaluate pass rates and hiring eligibility to determine if any organizational changes are needed. If success rates continue for another year we will consider if a different outcome needs to be measured.
